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Know The Code

The 1971 Legislature ordered student codes for each school district as well as minimum conduct code requirements to be developed by Dale Parnell State School Sup't. and the state Board of Education.

Specific rules and regulations under each category have been developed by Morrow County School District. Standards related to search and seizure, dress and grooming, causes for discipline, student assembly, suspension and expulsion, alcohol and drugs, tobacco, attendance, have been developed within the code.

Part of the reasoning behind the Legislature's action was that in too many cases students and parents did not know the bounds within which students were expected to operate at school.

This was because many school conduct and rights codes were too loosely spelled out and on some aspects of student conduct and rights there were no policies to follow.

Such a code should take the guess work out of what students can do or not do and what the result will be if they do or don't do!

Ione's principal Dennis Brandon will review the code for the Ione people tonight at 8 p.m. at the Ione Cafeteria for the PTA program.

Rep. Ullman Urges Federal Soil Erosion Help

The federal government should be much more committed to solving the serious soil erosion problems in the Pacific Northwest's major river basins, Congressman Al Ullman said Monday. Ullman co-sponsored legislation this week to permit the Department of Agriculture to enter into special soil conservation contracts with farmers and landowners in the Columbia-Snake-Palouse River region.

"Irreplaceable topsoil is being washed down into these rivers every year," Ullman said. "Farmers and landowners all through the region are beginning to suffer losses and crop damage amounting to millions of dollars."

Co-sponsoring the legislation are Congressman Tom Foley and Mike McCormack of Washington, and Orval Hansen and James McClure of Idaho. According to Ullman, the bill would initiate an environmental and conservation program in a 46-county area similar to a program now under way in the Great Plains.

The measure would allow the federal government to pay up to 80 percent of the cost of such conservation practices as water-catches contouring, crop cover and watershed levees and wind breaks. Ullman said the program would not only help crop and range land, but would curtail erosion damage to wildlife, fish, water supplies and recreation areas.

Race Relations Sunday Near

This Sunday, Feb. 13, is designated as Race Relations Sunday by United Methodist churches. A special offering for the 12 United Methodist black colleges will be taken. These colleges are all accredited. They have served their community and county for more than a century.

They have produced: five of the churches active black bishops; ninety-five percent of its black ministers; ninety percent of Methodism's black professional men and women—physicians, social workers, and executives.
