

## Cards Win Over Helix

The Lone Cardinals won a 38-48 victory over Helix on Friday, Feb. 7. Prior to this game, Helix had been undefeated in conference play. The first quarter ended with a tied up score, 11-11. The Cards were down 15 points in the second quarter with 2 minutes to go. Lone then found the range and scored 11 straight points, while holding their opponents scoreless. At halftime Lone was down by 4.

Coach Del LaRue's Cards put up 7 field goals in the third period which put them ahead by 2 at the end of the third quarter. The final period saw Helix come within 3 points but could not come any closer as the Cardinals defense held.

David Warren netted 21 points to take high scoring honors for the Cards. Dick Snider and Nick Marick added 15 and 11 respectively. Clint Krebs scored 6 points, followed by Kent Gutierrez with 4 and Richard Hamlett with 1. Terjeson had 14 points for Helix, followed by Ellis with 11.

Coach LaRue commended the rebounding efforts of Marick who had 19 and of Warren, who brought down 13. He said of the entire team that the "defense was especially good."

Lone shot 34 percent making 23 of 68 as Helix made 21 of 73 for 28 percent. The Cardinals made 12 of 17 free throws for 70 percent, while Helix netted 6 of 13 for 46 percent. The victors pulled

down 51 rebounds to Helix's 36.

In conclusion, Coach La Rue said that "to stay in the running, we've got to win this weekend against Umpine and Weston."
