

## Apply Now! Deadline Soon For 4-H Awards

Morrow County 4-H members have an opportunity to participate in the 4-H awards program designed to recognize young people for their accomplishments, says Don Stangel, Morrow county extension agent.

Scholarships, trips and medals are some of the awards available to older 4-H members. Donations out, and those eligible should begin planning now for future applications.

The National 4-H awards program is administered through the National 4-H Service Committee and includes county medals for outstanding achievement in project areas, trips to National 4-H Congress in Chicago, college scholarships and other awards.

To be eligible for the national award program, young people must be 15 or older and have been in 4-H at least three years. Morrow County 4-H members 15 and older are eligible to be considered for county medals.

This year for the first time in several years there is a national awards program in beef sponsored by Celanese Corp.

"The awards program is made possible by gifts and grants from private business," explains Lois Redman, Oregon State University extension 4-H and youth specialist "which emphasizes the belief that businessmen have in the value of the 4-H program."

The awards program is constantly changing and shifting on the national level, reflecting interests of 4-H members and the current times, Miss Redman adds. Scholarships have steadily increased in value as college costs have risen. Last year, 4-H members nationally received 285 scholarships worth over \$178,000.

The Oregon Bankers Assn. annually sponsors trips to National 4-H Congress as does Meier and Frank. In addition, scholarships are given by Standard Oil Company, the Oregon Wheat Commission and Union Pacific International Livestock Exposition participation with the O. M. Plummer award.

Eligible 4-H members may enter their record books in three different project areas, Don explains. Those interested in applying for consideration should contact their 4-H leader, or the Morrow County Extension Office soon, as county nominees are due in the state 4-H Office by April 1, and in the county office by March 1.

Oregon nominees for national awards will be selected late this spring, but the actual award is not made until fall and depends upon successful completion of this year's 4-H work.
