The article in the Education goes on to say that Mary Hall of Corvallis has become the second woman to hold the office of assistant superintendent for the Oregon Board of Education.

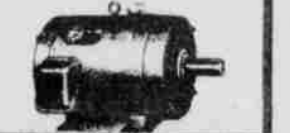

Mrs. Hall is the wife of William T. Hall, assistant professor of history at OSU. They have two children Sarah 10 and John 7.

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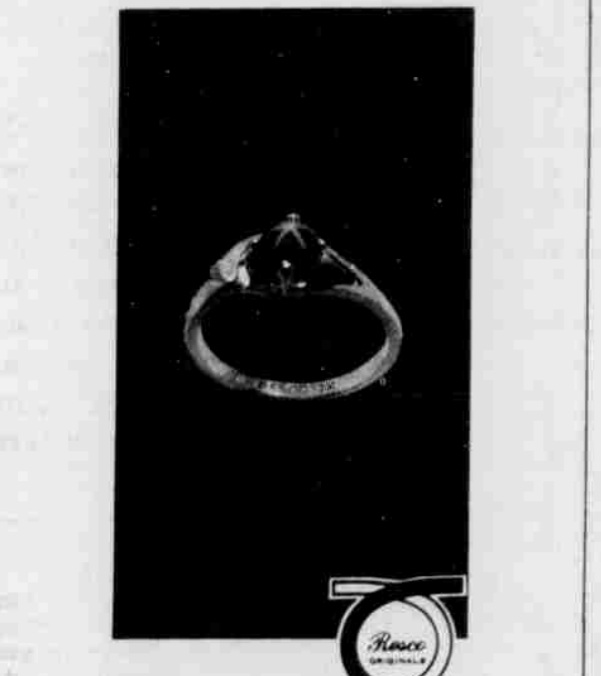
