## ARMY OFFERS "TRAINING & TRAVEL" OPTIONS

According to SFC Clare Rail local army recruiter, after training in the United States, enlistees in Combat Engineer or Field Artillery-Missiles (Rocket) career groups are guaranteed 16 months with the United States Army, Europe. Soldiers who elect the Air Defense Missiles of Law Enforcement fields can choose 13 months in Korea. Those who serve in Korea also have choice of assignment, world-wide, to any unit or geographical area where and when a vacancy exists in their job description and rank, and when they have completed their Korean tour.
