

**Drug Detection Pointers Given At Lions Dinner**

Thirty-six visitors and members were present for the Lions Club smorgasbord and program on February 24. "Heroin cure of addiction has a success rate of only 2 percent," Mr. Earley pointed out, "and the death rate from hepatitis is extremely high." A drug habit can develop through taking pills for weight reduction, for staying awake purposes, or for helping one to sleep better. LSD brings about hallucinations and can cause birth defects. A Class "A" misdemeanor—less than 1 oz. of marijuana in possession results in one year in the county jail and or \$1,000 fine. He stated that "95 percent of heroin addicts started on grass. Pushers are everywhere there is a demand—in towns of all sizes."

People should watch for changes in the behavior of the individuals, such as the wearing of colored glasses, dilated eyes, changes in sleeping habits, and temperament. A user of marijuana has a sweet "acid" odor to his breath. He concluded with this advice: "If you suspect a sale of drugs or that someone is under the influence of drugs, report it, as it may be the link needed in a case."
