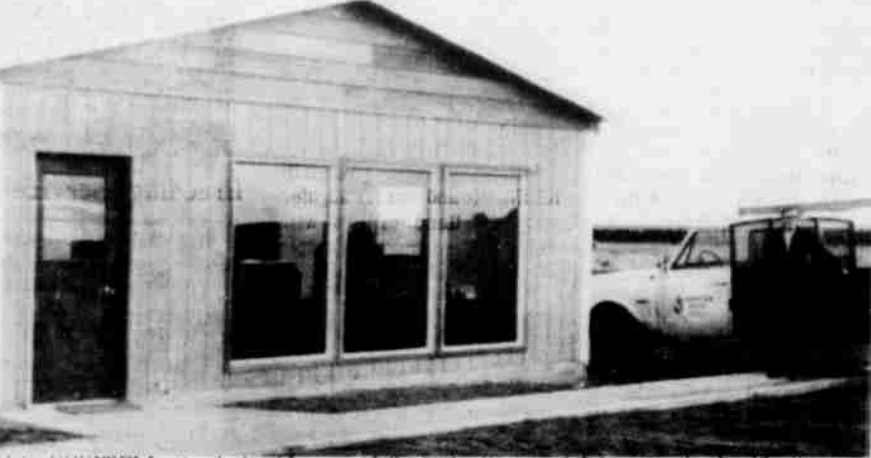

### Sheep Shear Schools

Plans are now being made for the 1972 sheep shearing schools sponsored by the OSU Cooperative Extension Service, reports Don Stangel, Morrow County Extension Agent. Shearing schools will be held April 16 and 19 at Vale, April 20 and 21 at the OSU Eastern Oregon Experiment Station at Union, May 2 and 3 at Fossil and May 4 and 5 at Prineville. The instructor will be John Landers.

During the two day class, Landers will give instruction on the proper handling of the sheep to prevent injury, show how to harvest wool most efficiently, discuss the care and maintenance of equipment and also outline the wool marketing process.

The OSU schools are held annually in an attempt to help provide trained sheep shearers for Oregon's wool industry. Don explains, "Trained shearers continue to remain in relatively short supply in relation to need. Applications for the Eastern and Central Oregon schools are available from the Morrow county extension office. Enrollment in the April and May classes is limited to ten persons each session. A fee of \$1 per day will be charged for the classes."

### James L. Cason Leads Discussion On China Policy

The Heppner Great Decisions Group was led through a discussion of U.S. China Policy by James L. Cason during its Sunday evening meeting at the Neighborhood Center. Because of President Nixon's journey and conferences and the attention which has been directed toward China recently, this discussion was most timely.

### Irrigation Training Given

Men trained to work with center pivot irrigation equipment will soon be available for work with irrigators, according to George Johnson, Area Extension Agent in Heppner. These men have just completed a course presented by Blue Mountain Community College. The 30 hour course was taught by Tom Sutherland of BMCC at Riverside High School at Boardman.

One of the basic reasons the course was organized by the Extension Service and Blue Mountain was to meet the manpower training requirements in the expanding irrigation farming in the area. The course was taught to upgrade the skills of those presently working with center-pivots and to train men to be able to work with the equipment. Fundamentals of electricity was the main theme of the course, with a continuous approach to relationships with center-pivots. This included the use of four major center-pivot equipment models supplied by the dealers and a field class with

the irrigation equipment. There were twenty participants in the course with an even division of representation between Morrow and Umatilla county. Several of the men will shortly be looking for employment with this additional training.
