Clint Krebs, lone High School senior, has been selected to be one of four Oregon delegates to the National 4-H conference in Washington, D.C. The conference, scheduled for April 23-28, is designed to provide young people an opportunity to be involved with major national program concerns and program development.

The delegates will encounter these opportunities while at the conference: Meeting 4-H'er's from other states and countries; listening to inspirational speakers; touring points of interest in the Washington area; visiting Capitol Hill; having conferences with congressmen; having discussions of major issues facing 4-H in the future; developing recommendations to increase the impact of 4-H; and meeting high level government officials.

Delegates were selected on the basis of their 4-H experiences and on their abilities to express the concerns of young people and to consider critical issues affecting the 4-H program.
