

Riverside Wins Consolation by Topping Culver

Boardman's Riverside Pirates finished their Columbia Basin Tournament participation in glory by topping Culver 63-59 to win the Consolation Championship for the Region III meet last Sat. afternoon in Pendleton.

Riverside has played several really exciting games in these last few weeks—beating Cascade Locks in an all-Pirate struggle, considered an upset, just before the regional tournament. Their first tournament game Thursday was a 75-59 loss to McEwen which went on to win over Condon 94-79 and clinch the second of the two Region III berths in this week's state tournament. Pilot Rock won the first berth by downing the Athena team 72-62 for the region championship on Sat. night.

In Riverside's first two tournament games Ron Baker was outstanding. He scored 24 points against McEwen and 19 against Helix which Riverside nosed out Friday by 52-51. Riverside's rebounding efforts were especially remarkable Friday they out-rebounded Helix, 40-25, and on Sat. they rebounded 33 to Culver's 30.

On Sat. against Culver Ron Baker fouled out with 4:32 to play which really put additional pressure on other team members. They came through in winning style, however, Gary Fredrickson and Rick Parlow popped in 14 points apiece, Tony Barnhart had 10 and Bob Ryan 9. Before he left the game Ron Baker had made 12 points and grabbed 20 rebounds.

The only tournament all star recognition was given by Pendleton's KUMA radio. They named Ron Baker to the second team. He was 2nd in total rebounds for the tournament, and 5th in scoring.

The Riverside Coach, Bob Byrd, said the team really hoped to win the tournament. It was very difficult to come back the way it did after that first demoralizing loss to McEwen which they had beaten once during the year, but which was so "hot" in their tournament meeting that it shot 60 percent from the field.

Coach Byrd, the Pirate squad, all of Riverside School and its Boardman-Irrigon rooters surely earn sincere congratulations for their fine showing this season.
