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REMEMBER THIS? REMINISCE!

57 Years Ago—1915

Nearly sixty representative citizens of Morrow County sat down at the banquet table in the Palace Grill last Friday evening to partake of the sumptuous feast placed before them and to listen to toastmaster W.W. Smead and the eight or ten speakers who addressed the meeting during the evening. It was an enthusiastic meeting and the harmony expressed denotes that the citizens of the county are a unit in the campaign for better roads.

Among the evening's speakers was George J. Curran who talked on "The Benefit to the Farmer from Good Roads." Mr. Curran's idea was that the best way to bring about this cooperation was by building good roads in order that farmers may get to town with the least possible difficulty. He said he would rather live twenty miles from town on a good road than close to town on a poor road.

Over \$2,000 was raised by popular subscription for better roads in the county. Among those contributing were: Palace Hotel, \$100; Minor Bros, \$250; First Nat. Bank, \$250; Thomson Bros, \$50; D.E. Gilman \$33; A.M. Phelps \$30; Mrs. Winnard & McMurdo, \$25.
