Reseal Program Announced

The Commodity Credit Corporation has just announced their commodity loan extension authorizations.

All farm stored grain loans may be extended for the 1972-73 storage period from June 1, 1972 to May 31, 1973. Only 1970 and 1971 crops of warehouse stored wheat may be extended. No barley stored in commercial storage under warehouse loan may be extended.

This means that all warehouse stored barley under CCC loans will be required to either be forfeited or repaid, before May 31, 1972. Those not repaid will automatically be acquired by CCC in repayment of the loan.
