Class limit for those working on the Geodesic Dome was set at 10. Electing to work on this project during Environmental Awareness week

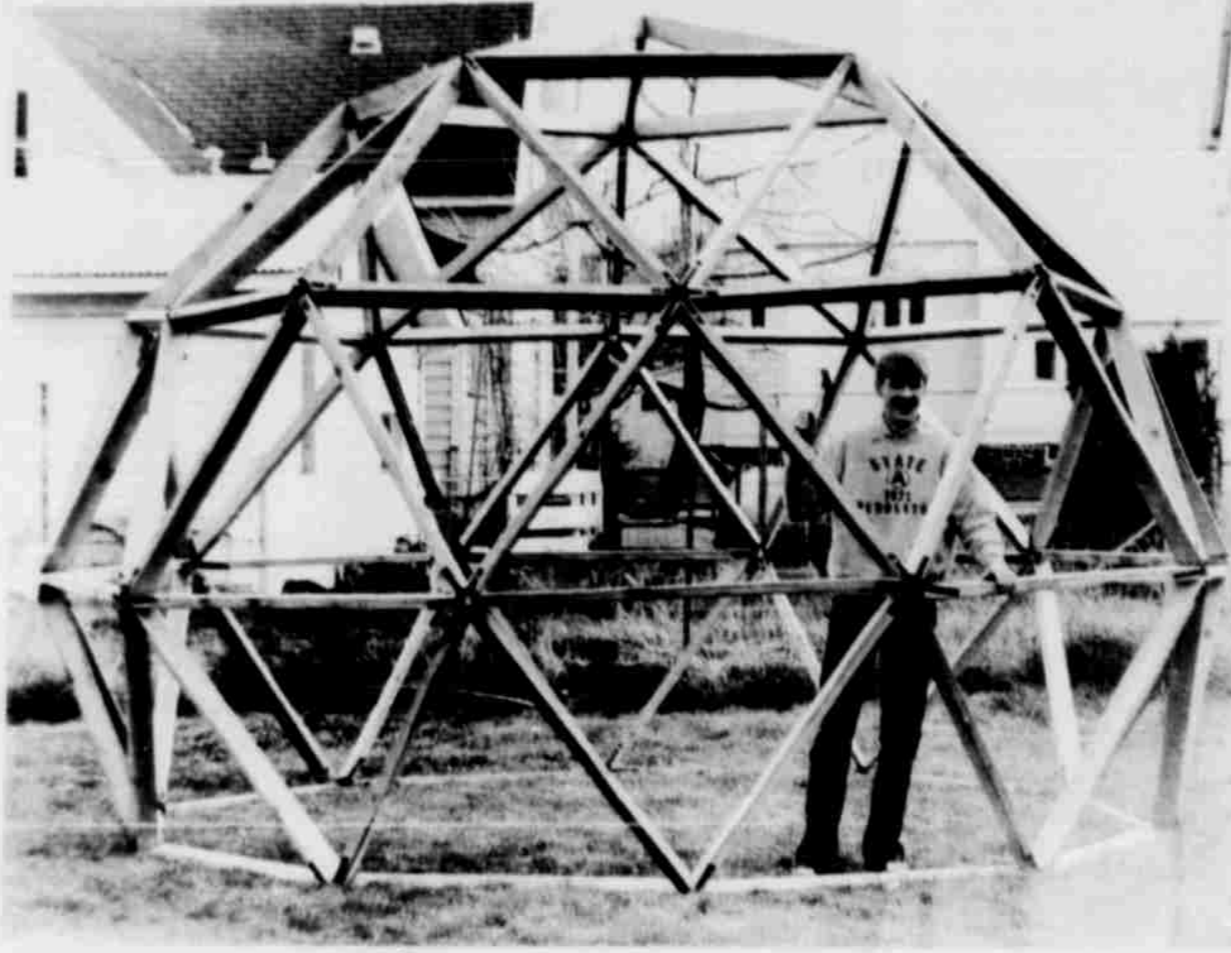

The Astro Dome in Houston, Texas is a Geodesic Dome structure. TV shots of the World's Fair at Tokyo showed a Geodesic Dome housing one of the exhibits.

The Geodesic Dome, the students learned, is a form of modern architecture. Made of triangles, a tension system creates an equal amount of pressure on the vertices of each triangle.

It is an economical way of spanning large areas of space. The formula was taken from the originator Mr. Buckminster Fuller, author of the outstanding "Spaceship Earth." His original conception of this type of structure came from nature, snow flakes and thistles.

Instructors were Tom Shear and Bob Clough. Mr. Shear purchased the lumber and pipe for the construction and Pettyjohns donated the banding. Mr. Shear and M. Clough assisted by Kelley Wolff sawed the 2x4's in lengths for the project prior



to the construction.

Later Mr. Shear will dismantle the handsome structure and take it to Eugene where his dad may reconstruct it for one of his small-

er greenhouses.

Mr. Shear was enthusiastic about the week of activities and felt the type of learning would be highly beneficial to the students.

Environmental Week Has Recycling Project

Daring Ecology Week at Heppner High School a group of students participated in a recycling study and became more aware of the pollution occurring through the use of cans, glass, and paper containers.

The students are concerned and are asking residents to participate in an effort to do something about collection of these articles for recycling. Students suggest that drop stations for the articles be placed at local grocery stores or other convenient places.

Some civic group must assume the responsibility for taking collected articles to a recycling station. Students are willing to help in this undertaking.

Residents should prepare articles to be recycled as follows: Cans - rinse, remove both ends, place them inside can and flatten, place in heavy paper bags.

Newspapers - tie in bundles. Cardboard Boxes and similar cardboard articles - flatten and tie in bundles. Glass - rinse bottles, remove all metal, plastic and paper. Collect separately from cans. Sort your recyclables from other wastes (Potato peelings, etc. can be made into a compost pile to add to your garden soil).

These are the recommendations: Mansfield, Sharon Peabody, and Barbara McCarl. After participating in an attempt to do something about recycling. They say "If you care about your environment, please participate".

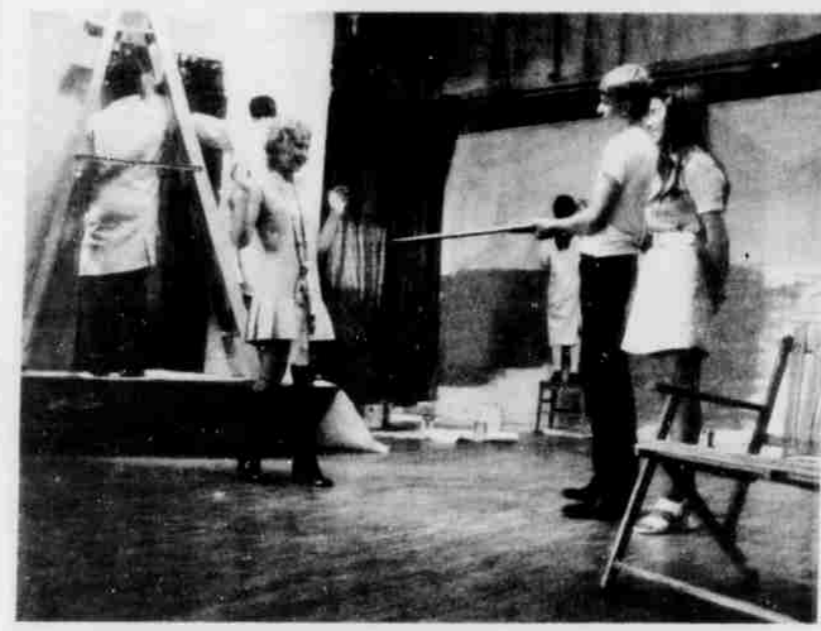
