Old Hotel Still Open

The old Hotel which is a historic landmark in Heppner will not close if Mrs. Esther Van den Biesen, contract purchaser, has her way about it. She told the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber Monday that the hotel would operate as usual pending the outcome of bankruptcy proceedings by the owner George Gordon of Seattle.

The Chamber unanimously voted to support every effort possible to keep the hotel operating. Attorney Herm Winter was expected to relay the chamber action to Samuel Steiner, Seattle attorney in the bankruptcy proceedings.

Spring Wheat Meet Scheduled May 9

The annual spring meeting of the Morrow County Wheat Growers Assn. will be held at Lexington Grange Hall, Tuesday, May 9, at 7:30 p.m.

The main topic of discussion will be the William Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970. Featured speaker will be Clint Weaver of State Accident Insurance Fund. The law provides that each employer, including those in agriculture, has the basic duty to furnish his employees employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing, or are likely to cause, death or serious physical harm, and to comply with occupational safety and health standards issued by the Department of Labor.

Penalties in effect NOW! 1. \$50 fine for not posting safety code. 2. \$100 fine for no safety record. 3. \$200 fine for not reporting a fatality within 48 hours.

Government inspectors are now working in Oregon with fines of \$50 to \$25,000 being assessed.

OSHA can not be ignored and every farmer should be informed about the law and its effect on all employers in agriculture. President Jerry Myers says "The 1972 Morrow County Conservation Man of the Year will be announced."

FISH DROP

Fishing season opened Sat. in Heppner, cold and with occasional snow flurries and later sunshine came out occasionally. Fishing was surprisingly good even though no fish had been planted since June. A few got their limit of 10, over 6 in. trout.

This week saw the first fish planted in Rock Creek Rhea Creek, Willow Creek and Cutsforth Pond by the Oregon State Game Commission. Glen Ward said they planned to drop fish on the following schedule: May 2, 2500 nine inch trout in Rock Creek in the Parker Mill area, 1000 in Rhea Creek, Willow Creek and in Cutsforth Pond. On May 18 and again on June 6 another thousand will be divided between Rhea and Willow Creeks and Cutsforth Pond.

School Election Vote Light

The only contested position, Heppner's place on the advisory committee went to Mrs. Judy Buschke. Complete results of the May 1 school election are: Jack Sumner 151 and Pauline Winter 179 votes are re-elected from Zone V and Zone VI for four more years on the school board. Heppner-Lexington advisory committee positions will be filled by Ronald Haguewood, Hardman-Ruggs area, 94 votes, 3 yr. term; Virginia Grieb, Lexington area, 96 votes, 3 yr. term; Judy Buschke, Heppner area, 68 votes, 1 yr. term. Mrs. Marilyn Robinson had 38 votes. John Edwards received 49 votes from Lexington and Ione to win the lone position on the advisory committee.

The Boardman-Irrigon advisory committee positions went to Kenneth Broadbent, 49 total votes; M. Gayle Shoemaker, 45 total votes; John Matthews, 46 total votes; Kenneth Broadbent, Boardman and Gayle Shoemaker, Irrigon, will serve 3 year terms; John Matthews, Irrigon has a 1 yr. term.

Mysterious Fire Destroys Cabin

The Jack Van Winkle's cabin burned to the ground some time after Sunday afternoon April 23. It was one of three cabins about 20 miles up Willow Creek Road just before the pavement ends. Jack says it was not insured. He has had this cabin for about 12 years and valued it at \$3500. He says, "All that is left is the concrete floor and a mess that needs cleaning up."

Council Passes Two Ordinances

At Monday's City Council meeting, final readings were passed on Ordinance 382 and Ordinance 383. First ordinance is for vacating a portion of Cannon Street requested by adjacent owners Howard Bryant and Roy Quackenbush. The other ordinance is a subdivision matter to regulate streets, sewer and water service, lot sizes and building with subdivisions in Heppner. It is expected to act as a guideline for the Planning Commission.

A delegation of Jaycees appeared in regard to obtaining a permit for a carnival that would probably locate in the block between the Hotel and the Wagon Wheel. A Council committee will work on the matter with the Jaycees.

Lois Winchester appeared in regard to the dog situation. She said in order to control the large number of homeless dogs it might be well to have a high priced license or unsprayed dogs. She said there has been no place to take dogs since last Aug. Attorney Abrams said State set the fees and County collects the fees for a fund to repay people for damages done by dogs, such as killing sheep.

Mrs. Van den Biesen appeared as owner of the Hotel contract and requested support of the City Dads in keeping the Hotel open. She said she plans to do all she can to keep the Hotel operating. Council agreed to send a letter telling of the City Council support in the matter. Joe Worlein requested an extension of his temporary permit for a mobile home. He is looking for a permanent location. Council granted a 60 day extension.

W.W. Weatherford requested a building permit to remodel the Car Wash, which he has purchased, into a new Laundromat. Council delayed action until specific plans are presented.

Mayor Collins read a letter from Attorney Herman Winter in regard to the Paulis Trucking Co., on behalf of adjacent resident, Mr. McIntyre who said the trucking firm was raising much dust in the area and it was noisy during late hours. A petition signed by 38 people was also presented along with the letter. Mr. Paulis stated he had trucks there for maintenance only which is done at night as trucks are on the road in the daytime. He said trucks are parked at the drivers' homes and leave between 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. He said there is a dust problem due to last year's flood but he denied there is excessive noise. He stated he has a possibility of being here ten years and would like to get along with everyone. Several Councilmen stated they felt conditions
