### Bookworms Hear Huntley Memior

At the home of Mrs. Eb Hughes on Butter Creek, on April 11, Mrs. George Curran reviewed "The Generous Years" by Chet Huntley. Mr. Huntley who is known to millions of Americans as an NBC newscaster was born in Cardwell, Mont., grew up on a northern Montana ranch, in the little town of Saco, and a succession of other towns in the southern part of the state. He attended Montana State College at Bozeman, the Cornish School of Arts in Seattle and received his B.A. from the University of Washington at Seattle. He was a news broadcaster and commentator for radio stations in Seattle, Spokane, Portland and Los Angeles before going to NBC.

His book recalls the period just before the first World War up to the mid-twenties. The four people who influenced him most were his parents and a set of grandparents whom he describes lovingly. Exciting incidents that he remembers are the day the Fourth of July rocket got loose and few straight

through the door of the power plant; the night he and a friend lay in wait for a bank robber; the day the prairie fire came so close to burning the ranch to the ground; and the time he announced the play-by-play action of the World Series as it came over the telegraph key. This enjoyable book is divided into four sections entitled The Land, The Town, The Railroad, Epilogue. It was copyrighted in 1968 and published by Random House. Chet Huntley closes his story in a sentimental, reminiscent vein with these lines: "There are no more mud-holes on the Yellowstone Trail. It bears the name 'U.S. Highway No. 10' as it swings and curves majestically through the valleys and over the mountain passes. 'Ranchers, in their own Cessnas, fly to the Herford Show in Denver. 'But I have seen the buffalo grass .....rolling, rolling on its West Bench ocean... and singing its assanant song to the wind.'"
