WHY MOTHER'S DAY?

World-wide observance of Mother's Day had a modest beginning. The first Mother's Day celebrated resulted from the inspiration of Ann Jarvis of Philadelphia who felt one day a year should be set aside as a tribute to her mother. She incorporated this idea into the church she attended . . . plans were made to hold a special service dedicated to mothers on the second Sunday of May, 1907 . . . and everyone was asked to wear a white carnation in honor of his or her mother. It is unlikely that Ann Jarvis, herself, dared dream of the far-reaching influence of Mother's Day. The idea caught on and spread like wildfire. By 1911 every state in the union, Canada, South America, China, and many other countries had adopted the custom. In 1912 an International Mother's Day Council was formed . . . the custom of wearing a white carnation was modified. In 1914 Congress asked the President to issue a proclamation designating the second Sunday in May MOTHER'S DAY.
