Old Timer Recalls Early Irrigon

There were 4 generations of smiling faces as great-grandmother Evangeline Fagerstrom prepared to board the Matanuska ferry boat in Seattle to Juneau, Alaska. She will visit her sons Kent and Ivar Fagerstrom and their families there for months of May and June. She spent April in Irrigon, where she had lived for many years, with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Chester Wilson. She makes her home with her daughter Mrs. David Bauer, in Watsonville, Ca.

WHILE IN IRRIGON Mrs. Fagerstrom recalled many early day experiences, dating back to 1908 when she first came to Irrigon from Colorado with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L.A. Doble. She remembered that Irrigon at one time had a hotel, a drug store and a newspaper, called the Irrigon Irrigator. The night the Drug Store burned to the ground, she remembered well the Halloween party, in the upstairs Community Hall, over the Eberhart Wadsworth General Store. It was next door to the Drug store and as the building burned the windows became hot. Dr. and Mrs. Beck who were both pharmacists, had left the dog in the house with a kerosene lamp burning. Evidently the dog had overturned the lamp.

Addison Bennett the publisher and editor of the Irrigon Irrigator and also the postmaster, Mrs. Fagerstrom described him as a lively man with a white goatee. He received recognition for helping to promote the completion of the irrigation project here.

Her brother, Merrill Doble learned the printing trade in Echo. After he was married he returned to Irrigon and worked for Addison Bennett as a printer. He later moved to Pendleton where he carried mail and eventually became postmaster. Eve Doble as she was then known, wrote the school news for the paper.

Then there were recollections of the Carson Livery Stable, a big red barn on 7th and Oregon St., near where the City water tank now stands.

Since there was no refrigeration in Irrigon in the early days, people would sometimes take a horse and buggy to Umatilla to get a fresh steak from the butcher shop.

Therapists Come To Family Series

Howard Busse, director of Youth Adventures, Inc. a Portland Youth Care Center for troubled boys and girls, and his co-therapist Mrs. Arlene Linn directed and assisted the audience participation in a parent-teen-ager dialogue at the fifth session of the Family Life Series on May 3. The object of the dialogue was for each (parent and teen-ager) to learn and to communicate his own desires and feelings in a manner which recognizes and relieves hostility rather than denies and represses and thus prolongs ill feeling. The two therapists illustrated their methods and comments with actual experiences they have had at the Youth Care Center.

YOUTH ADVENTURES is the only center in Oregon which is co-ed. The present population is 29 equally divided between boys and girls. The young people live in cottages with house-parents—a husband and wife team—who relate well to youth. Most house-parents are in their late twenties.

THE CONCLUDING SESSION of the Family Life Series, May 10, was led by Rev. William Arthur and Rev. Edwin Cutting who dealt with the contemporary issues of different life styles and marriage arrangements emerging in present day society.

THE FAMILY LIFE SERIES has been an experimental endeavor. It was intended to be innovative in the development of community context, to maintain good communica-

tions where it already exists and to establish understanding where it may not exist. The participants in each session were asked to comment and to make suggestions for subsequent programs. Some possibilities will be discussed at the regular Juvenile Advisory Council Meeting May 15 at Riverside High School at 7:30 p.m. when a special guest will be Mrs. Margaret Myles, intake supervisor for the Donald E. Long Home of the Multnomah County Juvenile Court. The Advisory Council meetings are open meetings.
