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SAFETY ...FIRST but write Washington SECOND

No one would argue the merits of Safety First at home or at work. The same basic rules should apply to all. How difficult it is to write a law that would apply to the same degree to all employers whether they have two employees or 2000.

Just as last year's regulations on drivers of farm vehicles would have worked a hardship on the wheat farmers so does the new Occupational Safety and Health Act.

Last year's writing campaign was instrumental in exempting drivers of farm vehicles within 150 miles of the farm from the Farm Truck regulations. Farmers are now urged to write a similar campaign requesting an exemption for all employers with fewer than 25 employees from the regulations imposed by the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

Those interested should contact Representative O.C. Fisher of Texas through his Washington D.C. office. He is sponsoring a bill to exempt all employers with less than 25 employees from the regulations imposed by the OSHA.

One of the most common violations is failure to post OSHA forms. Fines appear to be excessive. Failure to post the official OSHA poster is \$50.

OSHA penalties are tough but it's important to remember that good safety practices lower insurance premiums, prevent unnecessary pain and suffering and keep production high. So even though eventually employers with fewer than 25 employees are exempt from the regulations, employers will want to maintain high standards of safety.

Mr. Heard - here is a copy of my letter to Gov. McCall in regards to his new tax proposal.

Dear Governor McCall:

In reply to your letter requesting my opinion of your proposed tax reform and school financing program, I have, for the past three years advocated, in principle, the same solution to our state's dilemma of these problems. You and your staff are to be congratulated on what I feel should be the answer. The "Serrano" case is a sword of Damocles, poised to plunge into the heart of our educational system. It may, however, be a blessing in disguise, as it will surely force us to change what is an unfair and inequitable tax system. Of course, we both realize there will be inevitable questions of any new tax system and the following have occurred to me.
First, how do we guarantee local control of our schools? Second, what do we do about the O & C counties? Third, can the fruit farmers and the potato growers afford the employer tax on migrant labor - would the program add to or decrease their tax contribution? Fourth, would the employer tax apply to cities and counties? My first reaction is that this would serve no good purpose. Also the problem of farm deferrals occurs to me.
Regardless of the answers to these questions, I pledge you my support both as a citizen and as a candidate for the Oregon Senate. I
