## New Cake and Frosting Recipe For the 1972 CAKE BAKING CONTEST

This is a standard recipe that must be used by All Contestants

#### APPLESAUCE CAKE

Sift together—  
4 cups all purpose flour  
4 tsp. soda  
1 1/4 tsp. salt  
2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
1/2 tsp. cloves  
2 Tablespoons cocoa

Combine and beat well—1 cup vegetable oil and 2 cups sugar  
Stir in 3 cups unsweetened applesauce (heated)  
Add: dry ingredients and mix well.  
Stir in: 1/2 cup raisins and 1/2 cup walnuts

Put batter in 3 9-inch cake pans. Bake at

400 degrees for 15 minutes, then reduce temperature to 375 degrees and bake 15 minutes more.

#### BROWN SUGAR FROSTING

3/4 cup margarine 1/2 tsp. salt melted  
1 1/2 cup brown sugar

Boil over medium heat for 2 minutes. Add 1/3 cup milk. Return to heat and bring to full boil. Remove from heat and cool slightly.

Add 3 cups powdered sugar. Mix well and frost cake.
