Graduating senior girls from Riverside, Ione, and Heppner High Schools were guests of honor at a luncheon in the Episcopal Parish Hall Friday. Soroptimist Club members were hosts for the first-time affair. Mrs. William T. Hall (Mary Joe Stewart), assistant superintendent for the Oregon Board of Education, a graduate of Heppner High, was the day's speaker.

Quoting from the Edu-Gram published by the Oregon Board of Education, "Mrs. Hall, 32, is assistant superintendent for planning, development, and evaluation and will be involved in administration of federal and temporary programs. One of her major assignments is to design a system to identify exemplary educational practices and programs, evaluate and validate their effectiveness, and encourage their adoption as standard practice in schools."

Mrs. Hall explained that the Board of Education is considering updating the current requirements for high school graduation which have stood since the early 1930's. She pointed out that the new requirements will emphasize two major changes: a shift towards demonstrable performance rather than just classroom attendance; and a shift towards a more relevant curriculum emphasizing course content which will prepare students for their life roles as consumers, citizens, members of families, workers, etc.
