### Girls State opened Sunday

Oregon Girls State opened Sunday for its 31st year when high school girls from around the state converged on the Willamette Campus in Salem. Girls State delegates from Heppner, Tami Meador and Lu Ann Kelly were taken down by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Kelly. Tami's parents Mr. and Mrs. Dick Meador will bring them home next weekend.

Sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary in Oregon, the weeklong event is a study of government for the 275 delegates attending. The girls learn about politics by forming their own city and county governments and electing state officials through two national political parties. A visit to the Supreme Court and participation in a model court trial are included among their activities. At the week's end, two delegates will be selected to represent Oregon at Girls Nation in Washington D.C.

### Don Munkers observes rescue techniques

On May 13, Don Munkers, to become the new director of Emergency Services in Morrow County formerly known as Civil Defense, went to Prineville to observe and participate in Search and Rescue training. The maneuvers were sponsored jointly by the Crook Community Search and Rescue and the state Search and Rescue Center, Salem of which Dan Viera is chairman.

Techniques were demonstrated for mountain climbing, under water recovery, snow rescue and land search. Don was most impressed with the paramedics rescue of the stranded boatman in the middle of Prineville Lake.

The Mountain climbers showed techniques for working around the rimrocks and canyons. Classes in survival, medical care, communications and various searching techniques were taught.

Each technique was demonstrated by rescue specialists. Mr. Viera emphasizes that they are available for training and assistance in a search but DO NOT GO until aid is requested.

A similar set of maneuvers are set up in Baker for the three counties of Baker, Grant, and Malheur in Oregon and two counties from Idaho.

### County problems...roads, dogs, sprinklers, weeds, gov't. men!

Desert Magic has requested the use of a section of old Hwy. 30 and 730 as a temporary landing strip. Before the request was made, they had moved in to widen with black top a section of the highway that is yet used by public vehicles. It was reported that a group from Boardman barely escaped encounter with one of the spray planes as it was landing. On Wednesday, the Court had received only a verbal request which they asked be in writing. The written request was received Thursday but as all commissioners were not present the Court was not to act on the request until Wednesday of this week.

FINAL BUDGET HEARING will be June 30. Matt Hughes reported dogs had been killing sheep in the Boardman area. His damages
