

Irrigon is proud of new fire truck

The Irrigon Rural District received delivery on a new fire truck Tuesday, May 30. Constructed by Western States Fire Apparatus Co. of Cornelius, Ore., on a 900 series Ford truck chassis, the unit is fitted with a 1000 gallon tank and a 1000 gallon per minute pump. The 276 H.P. provided by the 534 cubic inch motor coupled with a 2 range, 4 wheel drive should give top performance for both house and brush type fires.

The truck was delivered by Ken Good and he conducted training sessions Tuesday and Wednesday.

The unit replaces a 1942 Chev. truck with a 500 gal. tank and pump. It brings water available on wheels to about 2500 gallons per min. according to Fire Chief Don Adams.

The purchase was financed by an 8 year serial levy and is the result of much planning on the part of the District Board. A fire house was built several years ago which will house the 3 units owned by the District.

The Fire District was formed in 1946. Among the first to be organized in Oregon. Much credit for foresight is due past officers. Present Community plans look forward to an adequate water supply for fighting within the city.

potato grower needs sufficient financing at a rate of interest he can afford to pay.

The local farmer can't operate as the corporate farmer in tax loss operations, Marketing. The northwest pioneered marketing agreements. They taxed themselves to advertise nationally and worked with other groups

as beef for pattys and sour cream for baked potatoes.

Quality control-Problems in controlling disease. "There's too much government control," Jeap said, "we need some balance that is fair to all." He noted that last summer there was a dock strike, railroad strike, Western Union strike and a telephone strike while we were trying to harvest potatoes.

Freight rates are high from the producing west to the consuming west. It is up 143 per cent in the last five years.

He said he thought potatoes had grown to such a point in the area that an experiment station was feasible.
