100 Year pioneers honored

The descendants of Albert Wright, pioneer livestockman were honored at the Rhea Creek Grange regular meeting June 9th. Those able to be present were grandsons Raymond Wright, Walter Wright, great-grandson Harold Wright, and great-granddaughter, Beth Clark. Raymond Wright gave a brief history of the family. He said Albert Wright moved to this county in 1872 from Oregon City and homesteaded on Rhea Creek on land that has been in the Wright family now for 5 generations. Great grandson Albert and his son Dean now live on the original first homestead, taking over from his father Orin.

There were 3 children in the family, all born in Morrow County, Sylus, Anson, George, Julia (Bisbee) and Effie (Gilliam). As they grew older they each acquired part of the home place and additional lands and became stockmen too. Walter Wright told of his father, Anson, at the age of 12, staying alone in the mountains herding a band of sheep during the summer months. He stayed at the log cabin near Anson Wright park, land that now belongs to Don and Patsy (Wright) Anderson, daughter of the Walter Wrights.

The children of Anson Wright were Clyde, Maude (Bugg), Raymond, Myrtle (Clubine) Harley, Nellie (Kruger), Walter, and Samuel who passed away as a young boy.

The Anson Wright family home was four miles from the Raymond Wright ranch of today. The children attended the one room school in Spring Hollow during the summer months and a teacher was available. This school house was later moved to the site where the Grange Hall now stands and was used as the first Grange hall when it was organized in 1925. It is now part of the kitchen. Barton and Beth (Wright) Clark and son Ned and family operate the land of Raymond Wright and carry on the family tradition. They were recently named Livestockmen of

the named Livestockmen of the year for Morrow County. Harold, son of Clyde Wright, was also named Livestockman of the year several years ago and has cattle, sheep, buffalo, llamas and horses he runs on land that belonged to his father. Son Kenneth and family are very much a part of this and also operates Wrights Country Store.

The Wrights, their wives and children have contributed much to the history and development of Morrow County and to the Grange. Among the charter members of the Grange were Anson, Orin and Pearl, Raymond and Eva, Clyde and Mary, and Walter Wright.

A committee of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Wright, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wright, Pearl Wright, Elmer Palmer and Harold Kerr were appointed to meet with the Park Board to see if it would be possible to build a large fireplace at the Anson Wright Memorial Park and dedicate it to the 100th Anniversary of the Wrights coming to Morrow County.

Bob Stevens, reported for the Agriculture Committee that set-aside acres had to be destroyed by July 1st this year in order to comply with the grain program. Lots of new diversion ditches are being put in the fields throughout the county. Harold Kerr told of the Field Day to be held at the Pendleton Experiment Station on June 23rd where new grains will be shown in test plots, including New Hyslop wheat.

Archie Becholdt reported on legislation pending, and spoke against gun control. The Committee of Womens Activities will picnic at the Anson Wright Memorial Park
