The Indians vs Dodgers make up game will be played July 1 at 6 p.m. prior to the American Legion Fireworks display on the lone field.

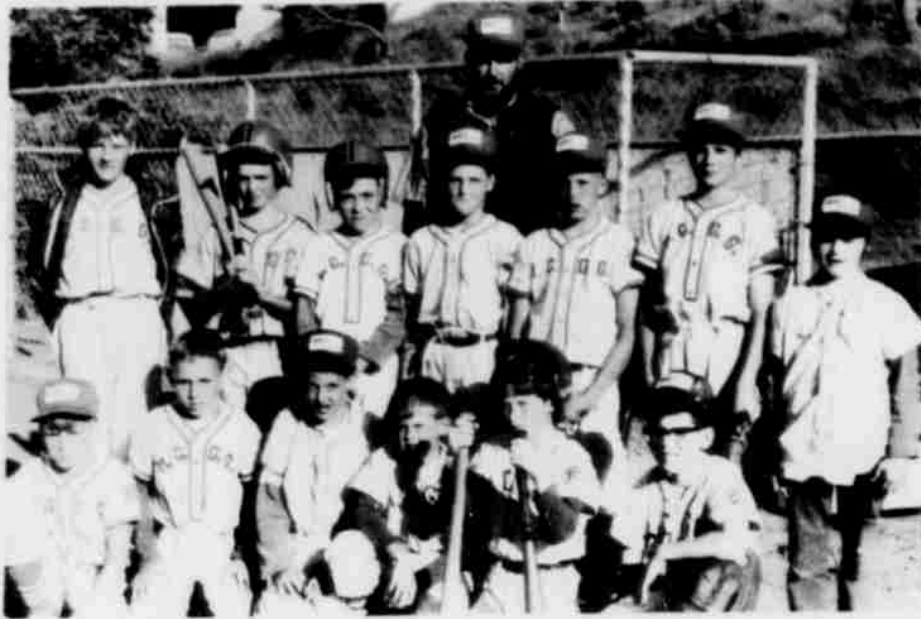
**Indians vs Braves**

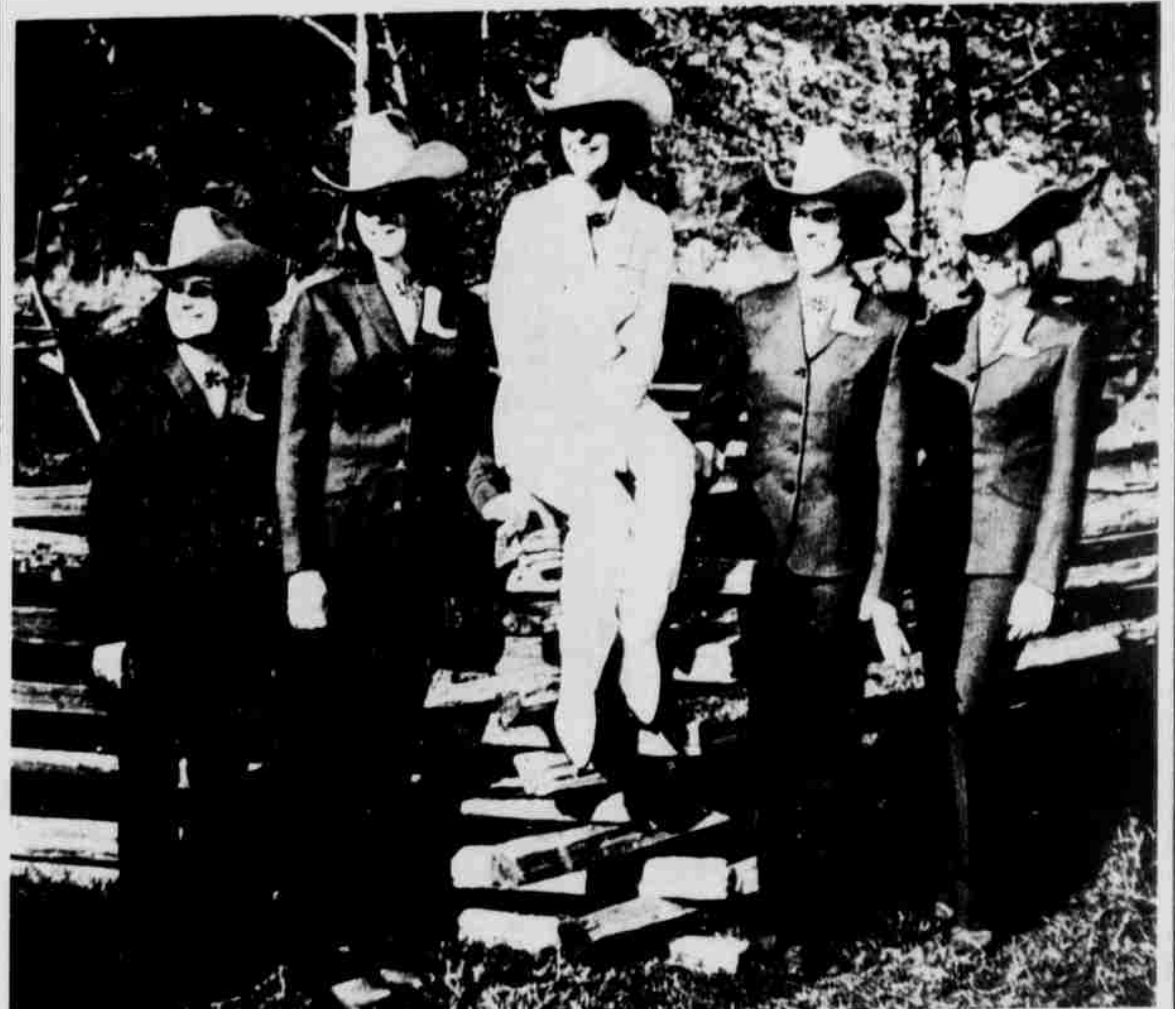
