Elizabeth M. Haldy

Funeral services for Elizabeth M. Haldy, age 85, of Friendsview Manor in Newberg, who died June 17, 1972 at her home were Wednesday June 21, 1:30 p.m. in Atwell's Newberg Funeral Chapel.

Charles Beals and Charlotte Macy officiated and interment was at the Friends Cemetery, Newberg.

Elizabeth M. Haldy was born Jan. 20, 1889 in Meadon Center, New York, the daughter of Edward Mott and the former Ada Miller. As a child she moved with her family to Michigan where she attended grade school at Basin Valley, near Adrian Michigan, then on to high school at Cleveland, Ohio and attended the Cleveland Bible Institute graduating in 1910.

She pastored the Camp Chase, Ohio Friends Church, then the Friends Church in Tecumseh, Mich. prior to her marriage to Arthur J. Haldy in Cleveland, Ohio on Oct. 15, 1913. He also was a

pastor of the Friends Church and they pastored churches in Ohio, Tennessee, Oklahoma, Iowa and Washington before coming to Oregon. From 1936 to 1941 they served the Sherwood and Middleton Friends Churches, then moved to Rex until 1951 when they moved to Portland.

They moved to Newberg and the Friendsview Manor in 1961. Her husband preceded her in death in July, 1969. He was a recorded minister of the Friends Church and a member of the Newberg Friends Church.

Surviving are: One son, a minister of the Nazarene Church in Billing, Montana, Edward L. Haldy, two daughters, Josephine H. Howell of Spray, Oregon and Frances L. Haldy of Kansas City, Missouri; one brother, Bernard E. Mott, Sr. of Brea, California; one sister, Edith Lowell of Portland; 3 grandchildren, and 5 great grandchildren.
