Mrs. Ron Black, Morrow County chairman for American Cancer Society, was a recent speaker at the Soroptimist Club. She reviewed the successful efforts of the Society to reach the \$500 goal for Morrow County. The three-pronged program covers research, education and service. St. Anthony's Hospital was one of 22 Oregon hospitals to conduct a Tumor Clinic. Their emphasis is to educate people to know the 7 warning signs and encourage women to go for an annual Pap Test. The Society provides a loan closet to loan equipment that may be helpful to those with cancer. Counseling centers are maintained to provide counseling from clergy, cured victims and those from the medical field.

Mrs. Black said that two out of six are saved and the third one would be if the person acted soon enough. Victims 4-5-6 will die because no cure is known.

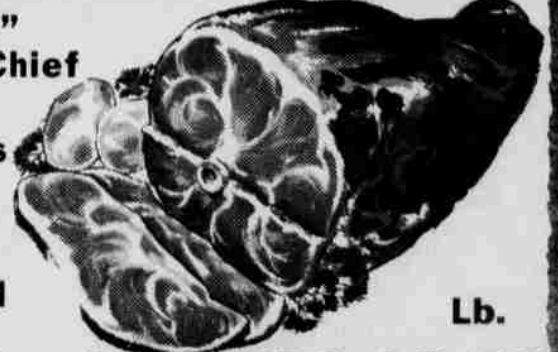
