She reported that some people of lower income are paying more than 50 percent of their income for rent and utilities. Some of the places have no water on the inside and toilet rooms are also outside. Government directives say that no more than 25 per cent should be paid for rent and utilities. In the study and survey that Mrs. Brindle will conduct for the County Court, people must indicate an interest in subsidized housing.
