

## Red Cross seeks Boat Safety Chairman

The Morrow County Red Cross board voted at their 2nd quarter meeting to buy two Cardiac Arrest boards for use at Pioneer Memorial Hospital. The boards are used when a patient's heart stops. They were purchased at a cost of \$20 each.

It was reported \$582.18 was collected on the Fund Drive. \$125 of this amount was sent into the Regional office, Mrs. Ned Sweek, Aid to Military chairman, reported she had had four cases in the last two months. One of them had required calls to Rhode Island.

In the absence of Norman Clow, First Aid chairman, Mrs. Charles Heard reported that two First Aid classes had been completed at Boardman. One for standard First Aid and the other an Advanced First Aid. A multimedia First Aid course was completed at Lone last winter and one here in Heppner this spring. Another multimedia course is planned soon. Anyone interested in this course should call Mr. Clow to have his name put on the list.

Mrs. Orville Cutsforth, Blood Chairman, discussed promotions for the next Blood Drawing Spring 1973. Hubert Wilson is assistant chairman. Mrs. Jerry Sweeney reported over \$14,800 had been sent to the Heppner Flood victims last spring from the Spokane office of the American Red Cross.

The board discussed the need for education in water safety and boat safety. With Lake Pendleton, there's more boats in the water in Morrow County than before. The board is anxious to find a volunteer Boat Safety chairman.

Mrs. Dennis Toney has accepted the appointment to serve as Water Safety chairman. She acted as lifeguard at the pool at Mountain Home, Idaho for a number of years.

## WSI Classes Soon Open In Pendleton

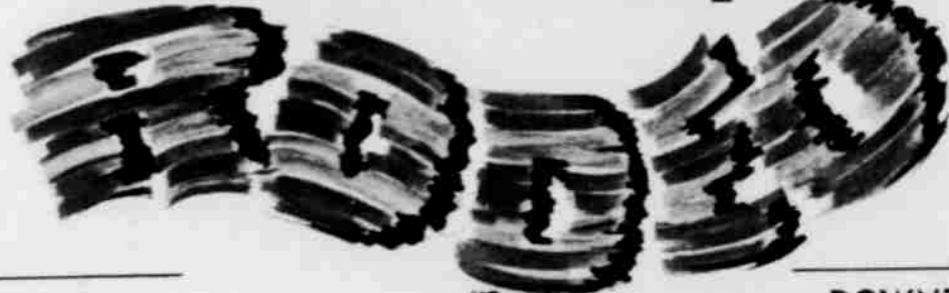
