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OES gives \$17 thousand to Cancer Research

The 83rd annual session of the Grand Chapter of Oregon, Order of Eastern Star was held June 19-21 at the Memorial Coliseum in Portland with 1600 members attending. Presiding over this "Treasures of the Stars Session" were Mrs. Dick Wilkinson, Heppner, and Karl Wipper, Turner. Worthy Grand Matron and Patron. Also present representing their states were officers from California, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, Iowa, Texas, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Louisiana, British Columbia and Florida.

A check for \$16,300 was presented to the University of Oregon Medical School for cancer research. Dr. Wm. Fletcher, Director of the Cancer Research and Tumor Division, accepted the check on behalf of the school and said it would be used in the tumor immunology laboratory where they expect a breakthrough soon which will enable them to control this disease. A like amount awarded to them last June has been financing their research. Dr. Fletcher said that although he understood federal funds were to be allocated to this department, they have not received any money as yet.
