Picnic Poisons

Picnics on warm days may be delightful, but unless proper precautions are kept, food poisoning may develop. Favorite picnic foods such as potato and macaroni salads, deviled eggs and meats to be barbecued are also favorites for bacteria that cause food-borne illnesses.

These bacteria do not grow below 40 degrees or above 140 degrees, so the simple answer is not hold foods between these two temperatures.

To keep foods cold, take along an ice cooler. Meats, fresh or cooked, as well as salads, sandwich fillings made with salad dressings and cream or custard desserts should be stored in it. If you are going on a hike and can't carry a cooler, take foods that don't spoil easily, such as fresh fruits and vegetables and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. Frozen sandwiches in plastic bags are excellent for hikes, for they will be thawed and ready to eat by lunch time.

Should you keep leftover picnic foods? Foods held more than 3 to 4 hours between 40 degrees and 140 degrees may not be safe to eat. This includes preparation, storage and serving time.

Free Oregon State University Extension bulletins may be of help to you. Ask for: EC 729, Foods Spoilage, Causes and Prevention; and EC 741, "Facts on Salmonella". Also available is USDA bulletin HG 162 "Keeping Food Safe to Eat".

CANNING TOMATOES? To be extra safe when canning tomatoes, add vinegar or lemon juice. At the time salt is added, add 2 teaspoons of vinegar or lemon juice per quart, or 1 teaspoon per pint. These new directions were recommended by research home economists at Oregon State University.

This additional ingredient assures sufficient acidity to prevent harmful bacteria from growing. It also highlights the natural tomato flavor. Tomatoes may be successfully canned by the water bath method if these directions are followed.

The Morrow County Court has announced some new rules for Cutsforth Park and Anson Wright Park.

Judge Paul Jones stated Tuesday there was comparatively little vandalism although in the bath house shower curtains disappear rather quickly.

Rates for trailers are \$2.50 a night or \$15 a week. Self-contained trailers are \$2 a night or \$12 a week. Camp trailers are \$1.50 a night or \$9 a week. Campers \$1.25 a night or \$7.50 a week. Tents are \$1 a night or \$7 per week. Camp trailers, campers and tents are not provided electricity at these rates.

Two new rules were added. No motor bikes are allowed off the Park roads. No unlicensed bike operators are allowed to operate motor bikes in the Parks.
