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**Sewer Plant to be Cleaned**

**Council Okays New Forest Building**

First item on Monday's City Council agenda was a hearing on an appeal against the conditional use permit to construct the new U.S. Forest Service building on the Loft-Rasmussen Addition.

Attorney Dennis Doherty represented Claude Buschke and said zoning is designed to protect the public. He pointed out that the Heppner zoning ordinance set limits on the City Council and that the Council and Planning Commission must adhere to the ordinance. Uses in the Loft-Rasmussen Addition are residential except for conditional uses compatible with residential use. He said permitting movement to a residential district will hurt downtown valuations and central business district convenience will be lost. He stated that the conditional use permit for an office building in the Addition was in violation of Heppner's zone ordinance.

Witnesses making statements as appellants said they didn't want to see commercial buildings in a residential zone; that the new building would create traffic hazards; that it would devalue home values and that it would not promote the general welfare as shown in the long-range City plan.

Making the statements were Don Strober, Ron Palmer, Claude Buschke, Jim Hager, Mr. Hager said it would destroy the value of his downtown business lot and that a commercial building on the hill would be a detriment because of traffic and danger to children.

Mr. Buschke stated that the place for commercial buildings was downtown or downtown business would be hurt and that empty downtown buildings were an added harmful thing to downtown businesses.

Mayor Collins read letters from other appellants against the new building location.

Writing the letter were Joan Hughes, Pat McIntyre, Lorena Shuman, Harriet Batty, Raymond Batty, Mrs. Ron Palmer. Their letters pointed out the location of the new building was inappropriate and area cannot stand the added traffic hazards and location was in violation of the City Ordinance.

Attorney Ralph Currin of Pendleton represented the builder but did not make a statement.

Randy Lott said item 7 of a section of the City Ordinance permits a public building as proposed which is not a commercial building. He said traffic would be negligible compared to the school. As to damage to property values, he said if this happened he would be hurt worst of all as he owns most of the land. He said he's had no objections from property owners up there. Sites on Main Street were not acceptable to the General Services Administration as that area is in the Flood Plain.

Mrs. Lott said the 25-mile per hour speed limit creates no problem. She said speeders and squirrels had forced them to sell their home property.

Warren Plocharsky adjacent property owner, said he felt the building would be an asset and said he has no objections to the new building.

City Attorney P.W. Mahoney stated an opinion backed by the Director of Planning who drew the City Ordinance that a public building is one put to government use by county, state or Federal bodies. Heppner Ordinance states building can only be used for that purpose and is at the discretion of the City Council.

**Kinard McDaniel Passes**

Area residents were saddened at the loss of a pioneer, Kinard McDaniel, 84, who passed away in Pendleton August 3.

Mr. McDaniel was born Nov. 12, 1887 at Newton, Indiana, the son of Samuel McDaniel and Harriet Stowell. He homesteaded in the Burton Valley District in the Hardman area in 1894. The ranch is still operated by his two sons. On August 28, 1912, he was married to Ima Allen at Heppner.

Besides his wife, Ima, of Heppner, he is survived by sons, Dallas of Heppner and Delvin of Pendleton; two daughters, Ramona Marshall and Elma Harshman, both of Heppner; one brother, Sam McDaniel of Hardman; 3 sisters, Alice Hastings, Pearl Steers, both of Heppner and Mabel Howell of Monument; 12 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

recommended the building permit be granted for the new structure.

Mr. Doherty said the biggest condition is the Zoning Ordinance and said the Council should look objectively at the ordinance and make its own decision.

The City Attorney stated that the building permit was allowable by Ordinance at the discretion of the City Council.

Mr. Peterson's agent—the builder—said other lots either could not be purchased or were on the flood plain and could not be approved by GSA.

In a vote, Council voted in favor of the Planning Commission recommendation. Passed by four to one with one abstaining. Favoring the move: Jerry Hollomon, Clyde Allstott, Robert Jones, Jerry Sweeney, Voting against, Dave McLeod. Abstaining, Rita Hedman.

The builder's agent said they would start on the new 46 ft by 110 ft. masonry building as soon as possible. There will be 20 parking spaces. Cost is expected to be about \$55,000. The building will be leased by the builder to the government and taxes will be paid on the building, they said. Completion will require 90 days.

A building permit was granted Betty McEwen for a \$3000 addition of a 20 x 40 room to her mobile home at 680 Riverside.

**SEWER PLANT  
DISCUSSION**

Gil Groff of the Groff & Clark Engineers reported on Heppner's sewer plant problems. He said this was not an unusual situation. He explained that the digester works much like a septic tank and produced odors at certain times. When exposed to air, there is 94 percent water and balance solids which are drawn out twice a month.

Some of the solutions he said were quite expensive. Sludge can be disposed of by hauling to disposal sites. He suggested a tap from the bottom and addition of a pump and a tank truck for hauling. He said when the City located a new garbage disposal site a little extra land would be needed. He recommended a thorough cleaning of the digester. The City has a sewer fund of about \$10,000 which can be used for cleaning and obtaining a truck if needed. Mr. Groff discussed the possibility of installing steam pipes in the digester to increase efficiency.

Mr. Groff expected to contact a cleaning expert Tuesday. Council experts immediate action on this serious problem.
