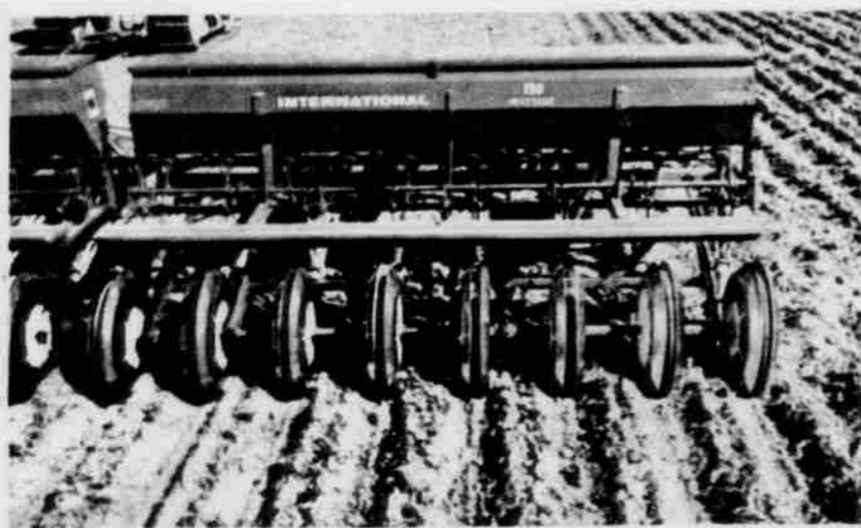

Oregon Ahead on Ecology

Oregon has been the leader in the nation on environmental improvement and this history was noted by editors from other states at the National Newspaper Convention held recently in Portland. Monday at the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce, James Van Dornelen Pendleton District engineer reviewed Oregon's efforts for clean natural resources that have come so far as to study sound pollutants. It started in 1900 with legislation dealing mainly with stream pollution.

A separate department was set up in 1971 by the legislature. It now includes quality control of air, water, land use, which includes solid waste disposal.

Oregon is the only state to recognize Freeways and parking areas as air pollutant sources. It has led the way to force the Corps of Engineers to implement on the Columbia river dams to cut down on the nitrogen content in the river. It has met with livestock ranchers and related agencies for satisfactory disposal of animal wastes.

Emphasis is on voluntary compliance. Permits are now required from any city or industry putting pollutants in air or water. The aim of the Department of Environmental Control (DEC) is the co-ordination of all natural resources agencies. Bill Collins won the pot.
