We spent the next few days riding with Bill as we attempted to locate the home site in town and the homestead in the mountains.

Along the way, he introduced Gene Ferguson who took us in his pickup to several likely meadows in various parts of the mountains.

Also through Mrs. Weatherford we met the museum curator, who personally escorted us through the museum.

Altogether we thoroughly enjoyed our visit mainly because of some very nice folks.

On advice of their attorney that they could "legally" allow a conditional use permit in a zoned residential area to construct a commercial building by reclassifying Mr. Peterson's proposed building by "public" building, they did so vote to allow

The article said the reasoning was that the child should be placed with a family of the child's religious persuasion.
