Among the better known ones are Three-faces-under-a-hood, Cud d'le-me-to-you and Kiss-me-at-the-garden-gate."

The pansy, belonging to violet family, is an annual or perennial treated as an annual. They prefer a sandy loam deep planting where the roots may be cool, not overshadowed by trees or exposed to dry hot sun. They are multiplied by seed, cuttings and sometimes by layering. 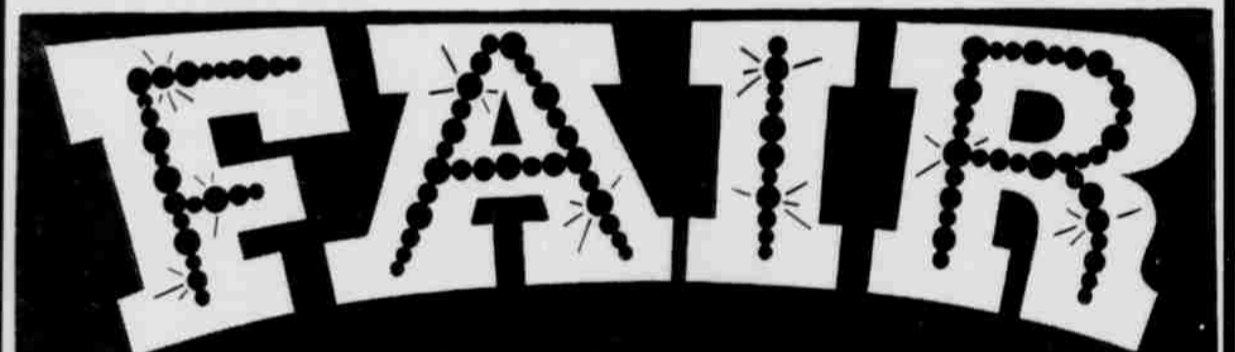
Bill operates his own fishing boat. Mona Lisa says they wish that fishing was better this year. They will announce their wedding date a little later.
