QUESTION:

Under ORS 307.395 an agricultural waste storage facility is exempt from ad valorem taxation so long as it is used exclusively for storage, in order to minimize

air pollution from field burning. Does this facility have to be in use on January 1, as a storage facility, or can it be vacant?

ANSWER:

The facility will still qualify for exemption if it is vacant on January 1, but will be used for the current years straw storage.
