Charles Dillon Passes

BOARDMAN-Funeral services were held Saturday at 2:30 p.m. at the Boardman Community Church for Charles Dillon, 91, who died Aug. 15 at the Kadlec Hospital in Richland, Wa. Pastor Neil King of the Boardman church conducted the services.

Keith Harmon of The Dalles was soloist and Jessie Underhill of The Dalles was organist.

Pall bearers were Willard Baker, Ariel Gordon, Delmer Hug, Walter Hayes, Harold Rash and Ed Kuhn.

Mr. Dillon had been a resident of Boardman for 52 years. He was born in Marlin, Mo. Nov. 27, 1880, one of six children of George and Alice Dillon. He came to Oregon in 1903 to The Dalles. He was married Feb. 8, 1911 to Clara Vibbert in Madras and they came to Boardman in 1920.

Survivors include his widow of Boardman; one son, Warren of Wilsonville; two daughters, Maxine (Nellie) Wrenn of Seattle, Wa., and Mrs. Lester (Carol) Moen of Boardman; one brother, George Dillon of Portland; two sisters, Maud Dillon of Portland and Molly Dillon of Falls Church, Va.; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Burial was in Riverview Cemetery at Boardman. Burns Mortuary of Hermiston was in charge.
