In the sheep division our 4-H'ers really did their thing.

Lori Rhea showed the champion Southdown fleece to start things off. Mark and Rhonda Sargent were named "merit exhibitors" after winning two blues and two reds with their crossbred ewe lambs. Only if merit exhibitor awards were given at the show.

Karen Richards of Irrigon showed the Champion Montadale to win the trophy given by the Pacific Western Montadale Sheep Breeders Association. Reserve champion honors went to Karen's brother Robert. To complete their sweep, the Richards' won two other blues and reds in conformation and showmanship, and Karen received a blue for her high placing in the Meat Animal Judging Contest.

"Make it Yourself with Wool" official entry applications are now available at the Morrow County Extension Office. Girls 10 thru 21 years of age may participate in the contest, which focuses attention on the beauty and versatility of American wool, encourages the use of wool in sewing, knitting, and crochet, offers young experts the opportunity to compete for valuable prizes and win recognition for their skills. Pre-teen (10-13) Junior (14-16) and Senior (17-21) age categories

are available, so all girls may enter. District 14 Director is Mrs. Robert Hoskins, Ione. District competition will be held November 18 at Blue Mountain Community College, Pendleton. Winners from the districts compete later in the year. One entry is selected, at State competition, to represent Oregon at the National finals in Washington, D.C. on January 23, 1973. Any girl 10 thru 21 may enter the contest by sending in the official entry application.

SLICK TRICKS FROM OSU EXTENSION SERVICE

EGG TIMERS can be used in many ways. To tell your child how soon he's to put his toys away or some other task. One young homemaker says it helps her little guy to keep the thermometer in his mouth long enough to get an accurate reading. He watches the sand and momentarily forgets the thermometer.

SAVE FREEZER SPACE. When freezing a combination main dish, put it in a casserole lined with foil. After freezing, lift the food from the dish and wrap for storage. This leaves your casserole free from other uses and freezes the main dish combination in a shape that

can be stacked in the freezer. Return to the casserole for reheating later.

SAVE TIME AND SPACE. Don't waste your time sterilizing a couple bottles at a time. Do a whole batch, and when they're cool enough to touch, take them out and fill half-way with boiled water, and seal with nipple and cap. When you need one, simply take it from cabinet and fill to top with formula (or evaporated milk if that's what you're using). Bottle needn't be warmed, since bottle and water were already at room temperature. And you don't take up all your refrigerator space with bottles of already mixed formula that are cold to the touch.

SAVE PLASTIC DRY CLEANING BAGS for use in packing things for mailing. They are lightweight, space filling, and pliable. Keep these bags out of reach of children.
