

Boardman Has Council Positions to Fill

BOARDMAN—A mayor and three councilmen will be elected to the city council in the November election in Boardman. Candidate petitions are available at the city hall and the deadline for filing is Oct. 6, according to Shirley Zielinski, recorder.

At the meeting of the council last week they were told by Gene Trumbull, president of the Boardman Lions Club, that the club has two community and public service projects under way. The members are making 12 litter barrels out of 30-gallon drums that will be placed around town as litter barrels.

The second barrel project is the placement of 30-gallon barrels around town as collection points for deer and elk hides. Gene says proceeds from the sale of the hides will go to a blind school in the region. "The No. 1 project of Lions International is to aid the blind and those with impaired vision," Gene says.

As a community service project the club is making plans to use the 4-H club building in the city park as a youth center for entertainment and recreation during the winter months. Plans are that young Lion's couples would chaperone the project and the full membership would have a hand in its development and operation. He said a public meeting is anticipated to explain the project and solicit the help of the community.

In other action the council renewed liquor licenses to the Nomad Restaurant, the Hitch-in Post, Dodge City Restaurant, Verla's Tavern and Hick's Grocery.

School Personnel Problems Discussed by Interim Committee

(Dave Green, Madras Insurance Broker and Republican Candidate for a seat in the state House of Representatives for the 55th District, has been for the last ten months a member of the Legislative Interim Committee on Education. Because of the imminent crisis in education, he has prepared a series of four articles which summarize the deliberations of the committee. A fifth article will summarize the conclusions of the committee following its final meeting in September. This article the 3rd of 4 is titled "Personnel Practices".)

No. 3 Personnel Practices
 Each member of the Education Interim Committee was assigned to one of the two subcommittees plus having a seat on the full committee. Mine was the Personnel Practices subcommittee. This committee at the outset was fairly broad and flexible and had the opportunity to discuss the areas of past education legislation and look toward recommendations for the next session. We have prepared legislation in a number of areas including licensing of private schools, licensing in private kindergartens, updating revocation and certification of teachers, a new driver education bill and legislation relating to community colleges.

This subcommittee's hearing certainly has exhibited to me the concern that our citizens in this state have for education. Education in Oregon has grown very rapidly—far more rapidly than the vast majority of the public has realized. In this regard, this committee assignment has been particularly unique to me since I have been exposed to the inner workings of the Educational community and to the other side of the coin as the general public looks at education. Certainly the complex procedures under the so-called "Confer, consult and discuss" statute (salary and benefit negotiations) are not well understood and a source of constant discussion among teachers, board members, and the public. Who shall (or should) for instance pay for the cost of a fact finder and how binding should his report be? Difficult questions at best!

With reference to private kindergartens, when does a day school become a kindergarten or vice-versa and are health and safety regulations on the local level adequate or must we look to uniform state regulations for the health and safety of the child? What about "Fair Dismissal", and what properly should be the procedure to protect the rights of the teacher as an employee and yet allow the school board to, in fact, exercise the authority and responsibility placed on it by the public? Is it fair to the teachers to have every major institution in the state use a different criteria for a degree in Education? This subcommittee has also had the opportunity to hear from interested persons in all segments of education about the factors as those that go into making policy decisions relating to people, teachers, students, school administrators, financing of education, and drivers education. We've heard the I.E.D. task force report which recommends 15 I.E.D. Districts across the state with the objective of providing services only, phasing out equalization as a function to a multitude of school districts in various counties.

This subcommittee has been the "Nuts and Bolts" Committee and within 40 days our report and the final drafts of proposed legislation will be completed. There can't possibly be a member of the public not affected by the 1971-72 Interim Committee of Education. To keep the pace Oregon Education is a valuable objective and I would hope it doesn't simply mean spending dollars!! Education is a lot more than that to both the child and his tax paying parent!!!
