The use of candid photographs throughout the book are eye catching and are a refreshing accent for the usual photographs of faculty, classes and activities.

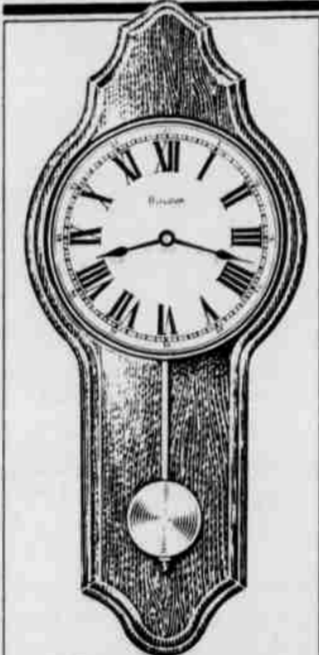
