"We finally put it all together," said coach Dale Conklin following a 29-8 victory over Pilot Rock by the Heppner High School junior varsity in football action played at the rodeo grounds Monday night.

The win evened the JV's season record at 1-1. The tie coming earlier at Pilot Rock, 0-0, and the loss to Condon, 12-6.

"It was a total effort," said Coach Conklin, "both offensively and defensively."

Heppner rushed for a total of 193 yards while holding Pilot Rock to 42 rushing yards and ran 46 offensive plays to the opponents' 23.

Wade Padberg opened the scoring effort with a 20-yard pass reception from quarterback Mike Orwick. The PAT failed and the local eleven took a 6-0 lead at halftime.

In the second half, Padberg collected a pair of touchdowns, Clayton Wilson and Joe Kenny scored points after, and Orwick ran 1 yard for the final score. Pilot Rock's lone tally came on a kickoff return with 44 seconds remaining and the PAT was good.

Cited for outstanding defensive play were Dale Munkers, Doug Gonty, John Myers, Wade Padberg and Wilson. In addition to the backfield, the offensive line of Steve Malcolm, Jim Wilhelm, Danny Marshall, Greg Clow, and Ray Whitaker did a great job of opening the holes for the backs.

Heppner takes a week off from the football battles with a bye this Monday and then gets back into action with a home contest in a rematch with Condon at the rodeo grounds October 9. Game time is 6 p.m.
