Working women important customers

The working woman who shops is more interested in time than money, reports the Bureau of Advertising, and may shop consistently at one store rather than taking the time to shop around from store to store.

Because of her time shortage, however she tends to be a careful shopper. A survey shows that 67 percent go to the store with a shopping list and 75 percent check advertising for specials. In addition, the survey shows that 80 percent of working women read a newspaper on the average day.

Since the working woman shopper tends to do all her food shopping on only one day of the week, she depends on complete stock and efficient organization. She is most interested in convenience foods and buys more frozen dinners, prepared salad dressing and instant ice-cream mixes.

The Bureau reports that the working woman is rapidly becoming the super-markets' most important customer. More than half the women in the age between 18 and 64 hold jobs and hence, help increase the income of the family.
