"They're Great"

Jack Sumner gave reflections of his experiences as tour director for a group of young people on the Odd Fellows United Nations tour last summer at the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce Monday.

He reviewed the process of selection for the tour. Students write and speak on a pre-selected topic about the United Nations. The winners in the local high school compete in a "speak-off" on the district level. The district winner makes the expense paid trip to visit the United Nations. There are 20 district winners in Oregon.

The tour went by bus 3390 miles through the midwest enroute and 3751 enroute home through Canada. A variety of accommodations were experienced on the trip. There were motels with and without.
