### What's Cookin'

The Home Extension meetings are dealing with potatoes this month. Potatoes in themselves are not fattening food, it's the sour cream, butter or gravies that place them on the least wanted calorie list. Recommended in special diets such as low sodium, low cholesterol and reducing diets. I tried one of the recipes in the potato pamphlet and it was one of the recipes I saved to try again.

**Potato Pancakes**  
6 medium potatoes, peeled (2 lbs.) I used one big one.  
1 small onion grated  
4 strips crisply cooked bacon crumbled (optional) I was serving sausages so I didn't do the bacon but it would be very good.  
2 Tbsp flour  
2 beaten eggs  
1 1/2 tsp salt  
pinch of pepper and grated nutmeg  
2 Tbsp chipped parsley  
Butter

Cover potatoes with cold water; drain. Grate at once and drain off water that collects in grating. Mix potatoes, onion, flour, bacon bits, eggs and seasonings, blending well. Heat butter (enough to be 1/4" deep) Just before butter turns brown drop in by tablespoons and flatten them out. When golden brown on one side turn pancakes over and cook until crisp and brown on other side. Remove to paper towels and keep warm while frying remaining pancakes.
