What Price Telephone Service

What should Pacific Northwest Bell charge for telephone services in Oregon?

The state's Public Utility Commissioner, Diarmuid O'Scannlain, started the thorough investigative process to answer that question through public hearings that got underway October 18, at Salem.

PNB applied for a two-phase increase in rates September 15 when it asked for an overall increase of annual revenues amounting to \$31.8 million, with \$13 million of that amount to be awarded as immediate emergency relief.

During a series of background briefings for press, radio and TV representatives conducted at seven locations throughout the state between September 25 and October 2, Dan Gundersen, head of PNB's Oregon operations, discussed the basic reasons why PNB needs higher rates. Here are the main points he presented:

1. As a regulated monopoly, franchised to provide communications services in stipulated locations in Oregon, PNB has a basic service commitment. We have honored that commitment.

2. That commitment requires that PNB meet demands of growth in Oregon resulting from increase in number of customers and over-all greater use of service. For example—

In 1972 we will connect 345,000 phones and disconnect 295,000 for a net estimated gain of 50,000 in Oregon.

We will handle approximately 12 million more long distance calls in 1972 than last year.

Our Oregon customers will generate about 60 million more local calls this year.

3. Meeting these demands causes PNB to continue to add to its various types of equipment—cable and conduit, buildings, local and long distance switching equipment, telephone sets and so forth. Cost for these additions in 1972 will amount to about \$97.6 million.

4. These equipment additions make it necessary for PNB to continue to raise large amounts of investment capital on a continuing basis in the competitive financial market.

5. To raise this capital, PNB

must have adequate earnings in order to treat investors fairly. We have not been able to do so because we continue to earn less than what the Commissioner determined in his last order was a minimum rate of return required to do so.

6. There are three ways in which adequate earnings can be accomplished:

(a) Limiting additions to equipment...this defeats our commitment to serve.

(b) Cutting back on expenses...the company has reached its limit on this.

(c) Increase revenues.

operating expenses and capital expenditures for equipment additions. Through the process of investigation and hearings, the Commissioner and his staff will rule on the question of what PNB should be allowed to charge for its services.

7. Further limits on equipment additions or expense reductions could lead to serious service problems - something neither the Company nor its customers would find acceptable.

8. The only approach left then is to seek to increase revenues while maintaining tight control over

VD Education Set For Study

Mrs. Edythe Connolly, Health Education Consultant for the Health Division of the Oregon Department of Human Resources, will present a training lesson on venereal disease for Home Economics Extension leaders and 4-H club leaders in Umatilla and Morrow counties October 30 and 31. Working with Mrs. Connolly will be Henry Horton, head of VD education program for the state department.

Extension home economist Molly Saul states that all Home Extension study groups are to send leaders to take the training. The handling of venereal disease will be the study topic for all Extension groups in the two county area in November. The lesson will be taught by leaders who receive training from Mrs. Connolly and Mr. Horton.

The Morrow county lesson will be Tuesday, October 31, at the Lexington School. There will be a coffee and get acquainted period at 9:30 followed by the lesson at 10 A.M.

According to Mrs. Saul, the lesson on venereal disease was selected by the program committee because of the high incidence of the disease among youth in our local area as well as nationwide. Information in the lesson will include how to detect and combat the disease and how to conduct an educational program to protect youth.
