

JV's win closing game

Heppner High School junior varsity football team ended regular season play here Monday night at the rodeo grounds with a 36-0 shutout over the Sherman County JV's.

The locals scored in every quarter in gaining the win which earned HHS with a 2-3-1 overall record for the season.

"Everything went right," said coach Dale Conklin. "The breaks went our way, the offense clicked, and the defense made the big play at the right time."

Sherman County threatened on three different occasions but interceptions and a fumble recovery thwarted any effort by the visitors.

Clayton Wilson opened the scoring effort by taking the opening kickoff 75 yards for a touchdown. Before the first quarter had ended, Tom Duggins scampered 79 yards to paydirt and then added the PAT. Wade Padberg added to the margin as he scored on a 30-yard pass play from Mike Orwick and got the extra point.

A third period 48-yard pass play from Orwick to Padberg ended in a score and again Padberg earned the PAT.

Orwick culminated the scoring with a one-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Cited as outstanding individuals were Steve Malcom for offense and defense, Jim Wilhelm, Danny Marshall, and John Myers on offense, and all of the backs both offensively and defensively.

"I think the season was much more successful than the record indicates. We had several first-year players on the squad and the experience and maturity they received this year will be a valuable asset to next year's varsity. It is going to be a lot of competitiveness in the future from the freshmen and sophomores as well," Conklin concluded.
