The South Morrow County Branch of the American Association of University Women announces the formation of its fall study groups. These classes are open to anyone. Participants in these groups do not have to be college graduates. The dates and frequency of the class meetings will be determined by the members of each study group. Nine topics have been selected for this coming year.

1. **A Dollar's Worth:** a study of consumerism. This might include such ideas as how to spend your money wisely, what we can do about the high cost of living, the advantages and disadvantages of shopping locally or out of town.

2. **The Crisis in Public Education:** an in-depth study of education at the local level. What are alternative methods of funding public schools? What can the public do to insure quality education for the children at all levels? What are the new methods of education?

7. **Shakespeare At Ashland:** a study of the plays to be presented at the next Ashland festival.

8. **Do It Yourself, You Crafty Person:** a series of classes designed to offer demonstrations on the latest crazes in craft projects.
