**NEW STAMPS**  
Carol Moen, postmaster, announces the coming sale of new stamps at the post office. The 1972 Christmas stamps, two 8-centers, go on sale first in Washington, D.C. Nov. 9, and will be on sale here Nov. 10. The Angels stamp is a detail from a National Gallery of Art painting, "Mary, Queen of Heaven", done in the 15th century by an unknown Flemish artist who is identified by art historians as the Master of the St. Lucy Legend, because of a painting on that subject he executed for a church in Bruges. The other stamp has

Santa Claus pictured on it. Whether there be one or not, Santa Claus has been generous to billions of children. Some believe he perpetuates the memory of St. Nicholas, who was a 4th century bishop in Asia Minor.

The second stamp is the Pharmacy Commemorative 8-center issued on the 120th anniversary of the American Pharmaceutical Association. It goes on sale Nov. 10 in Cincinnati, Ohio and here Nov. 11.

The third is the Stamp Collecting commemorative stamp, also an 8-center. The first United States stamps appeared in 1847, 125 years ago and were a 10-cent George Washington and a 5-cent Benjamin Franklin stamp. They were issued simultaneously. Stamp catalogs list the Franklin as No. 1 and it is this stamp that is reproduced on a stamp that salutes stamp collecting and collectors. It goes on sale first in New York, N.Y. Nov. 17, and will be on sale here Nov. 18.
