

### Irrigon on All-Emergency No. 9

The Irrigon Rural Fire Dept. is now on the 911 emergency hook-up, with headquarters in Hermiston. The hook-up was completed Thurs. night. In case of fire, need of an ambulance or police, dial 911, being sure to give name and location of your home.

When reporting a fire, state that it is in Irrigon and the fire alarm system in Irrigon will be triggered from Hermiston. The operator in Hermiston will then dial the Irrigon fire station and will give the name of the person reporting and location to the first fireman who answers the phone in Irrigon. Fire Chief Don Adams has had calls when people were in panic and would say "My house is on fire", and would hang up, without saying who they were or where they lived. On one such occasion he recognized the voice and was able to give help. Kenneth Lamb, who is chairman of the fire board, says with many new people moving into the area that it is important that they be able to give their location. Giving the name of a neighbor who is a long time resident of the community, could speed help.

### What's Cookin

This recipe for Carrot Cake comes from Bobbe Driscoll. It is the best of two recipes that she tried so in my book I call it Bobbe's Carrot Cake.

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp soda
- 1 tsp salt
- 3/4 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 4 large eggs
- 3 cups grated raw carrots
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

Mix and sift sugar, flour, salt, soda and spices. Add oil and mix well. Add eggs, one at a time. Beating well after each addition. Add vanilla, carrots, walnuts. Mix well. Bake in ungreased tube pan for 1 hour and 20 minutes at 350 degrees or two 9 inch greased and floured cake pans for 45 minutes.

The cake is moist, keeps well and is a good freezer. Bobbe recommends a Philadelphia Cream Cheese frosting. Add powdered sugar and a little milk to make a spreading consistency. She likes to add a pinch of salt and a little vanilla.
