PGE Looks at Alternate Nuclear Sites

Preliminary investigation of two possible nuclear power plant sites located in Wasco and Gilliam counties, under way for several months, has been completed by Portland General Electric company. The utility has been studying the sites as possible alternates to its proposed nuclear development at the Carty Reservoir site near Boardman in Morrow county, in the event the latter project runs into licensing difficulties due to its proximity to the U.S. Navy's practice bombing range southwest of Boardman.

From Portland this week PGE's Neil Woodley emphasized that the Boardman (Carty) site is still the company's first choice for an Eastern Oregon nuclear plant but time lags built into licensing procedures for site approval by Oregon's Nuclear Thermal Energy Council and the Atomic Energy Commission indicate a necessity for "banking" alternate sites.

Morrow county residents, members of the Oregon Congressional delegation, Boeing and PGE have been negotiating, so far unsuccessfully, with the Navy seeking a commitment for removal of its training facility at Boardman.

PGE filed Notice of Intent on the Boardman site last February. Located south of the city of Boardman the site is on land leased to the Boeing corporation adjacent to the Navy facility. At that time the utility said it intends to build a thermal plant, probably nuclear, with possible co-owners, for operation in 1979. At that time, the company expected to file site certification in February 1973 and indicated intent to complete the plant in 1979 or 1980.
