

\$220,000 for lake

Congress has requested that \$220,000 be held in reserve for possible construction of Willow Creek Lake near Heppner, according to Congressman Al Ullman.

The announcement was made in connection with appropriations of more than \$5 million for projects in central and eastern Oregon.

At the top of the list, according to Ullman, is the \$2.5 million appropriation for repair and expansion of the Shasta View Irrigation District facilities south of Klamath Falls.

Two other irrigation districts in the state also received major funding: \$530,000 to continue rehabilitation of the Tumalo Irrigation District's facilities north of Bend, and \$40,000 for upgrading Ochoco Irrigation District works in Crook County.

In this week's action the House also affirmed that construction of the Catherine Creek Dam in Union should now move ahead by earmarking \$700,000 in construction funds and tying them to a previous \$400,000 appropriation.

In addition, the House approved \$155,000 for restudy of the Umatilla Basin and Walla Walla Projects in Umatilla County.

Other House-backed appropriations have been slated for revegetation work on the Willamette River, and maintenance of the Klamath Project in the Klamath Basin.

New park now open

The Columbia River park at Boardman, a new Corps of Engineers project costing nearly \$1 million, will open for day use only July 1 for the balance of the summer.

A spokesman for the Boardman Park and Recreation District said the reason for not opening the 63 overnight camping sites to the public is a problem relative to the late seeding of the lawn. The reason or the lawn problem is the lack of water for irrigation. A drilled well failed to produce enough water.

City officials have said Boardman's municipal sewer and its lagoon disposal system is not large enough to handle the sewage for the new park, which creates another question for the park district.
