Gilliam rancher dies

Edgar Anderson, 74, a long time rancher in Gilliam County, died at a hospital in The Dalles Friday.

He had lived in The Dalles for the last 11 years, and before that was a resident of Arlington.

Mr. Anderson was born Feb. 4, 1899, in the Ione area. Surviving are his widow, Margaret E. Anderson of The Dalles, a son, Don, of Arlington; a sister, Minnie Reed of Walla Walla; and two grandchildren, Tami and Brad Anderson.

He was a member of the Valby Lutheran Church near Ione, a charter member of

Condon Elks Lodge and a life member of the Oregon Wheat League.

Funeral services were held Monday at the Methodist Church in Arlington with the Rev. James L. Wilson and Rev. Luther E. Sturtevant officiating. Concluding services were held at the Arlington Cemetery where vault interment was made. Casket bearers were R. J. Philippi, Lloyd Bartlemay, Clark VanGaasbeck, Virgil Woelper and Robert and Walter Hulden.

North/South squares off for Shrine game

PORTLAND—Fifty-eight of Oregon's outstanding senior high school football players of last year will gather here Sunday, July 29, to get ready for the 26th annual Shriners' Hospital All-Star game, scheduled for the night of Aug. 11 in Portland Civic stadium.

The 29-man South squad will headquarter at Concordia College in the northeast section of Portland, while the North will bed down and practice at Lewis and Clark College. Each squad will have at least 10 days of twice-a-day drills in preparation for the contest.

The rival coaches—Dave Powell of South Eugene (South) and Don McCarty of Centennial High (North)—have advised their respective athletes to report "ready for immediate action because we don't have time for you to play your way into condition."

South's squad features players from schools that are more removed from the Portland metropolitan area, and the series currently stands at 13 wins for the South, 10 for the

North and two ties. South was a 33 to 7 winner a year ago.

The South's head man, Powell, will be assisted in the coaching chores by Gary Olson of Bend and Chuck Solberg of Corvallis, while McCarty will be assisted in North's preparations by Darrel Davis of Hillsboro and Stan Stanton of Wilson High (Portland).

The game, often called "football's finest hour," has netted over \$500,000 for the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children since its inception.

The 8 p.m. kickoff will be preceded by an hour of pageantry, featuring marching units and bands.

Mail orders for \$4 reserved seats are being accepted now at game headquarters, 1119 S.W. Park Ave., Portland. General admission seats in the left field bleachers at \$3 will go on sale at Stevens & Son jewelers in Portland, in late July. They will also have reserved seats there. General admission seats at \$2 will be sold on the day of the game.

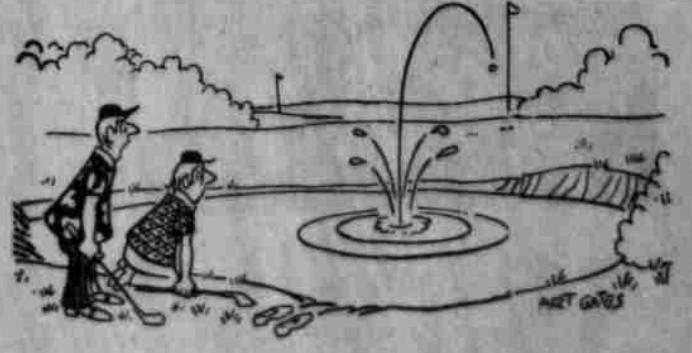
